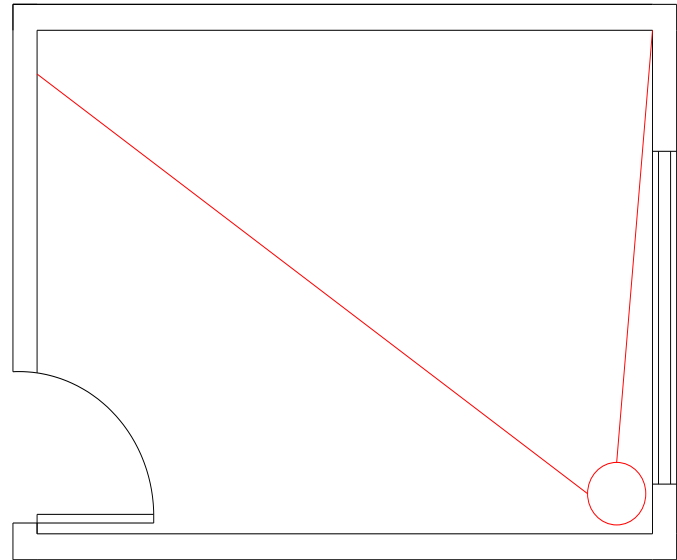




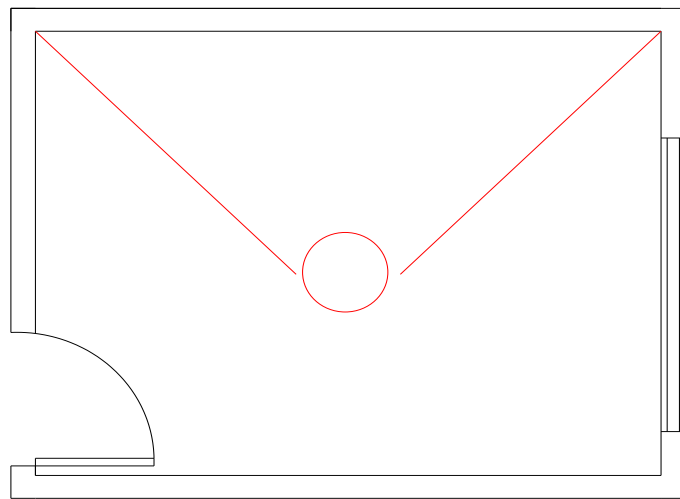

How to Photograph a room

Photographing a room should be an easy process. The below instructions should guide you through the process.



Step #1: Stand in each corner of the room and photograph as much of the room as you can. See the above photograph and floor plan. In the floor plan the red circle represents the photographer and the red angles represent the angle at which the photo may be taken.



Step #2: Stand directly in front of each wall in your room and take a straight photo of each wall. This can either be done by taking one photo of each wall (if the whole wall fits in the frame) or by taking 2 or 3 elevation photos of the wall which then can be pieced together to get the whole idea of what the wall looks like. See the photographs and floor plan above. The red circle on the floor plan represents the photographer and the red angles represent the angle at which the photo may be taken.

Step #3: Photograph all architectural features the room may have, such as fireplace, vaulted ceilings, built-in benches, built-in furniture etc...

*In all photographs be sure you not only get the whole wall but at least some of the floor and the ceiling in the photo as well. Also be sure that the photographs include furniture and accessories that you may be keeping in the room. If it is not possible to photograph the room along with furniture and accessories, no problem, you can do that at a later stage.
